DONORS MEETING IN COTONOU

- DRAFT AGENDA -

We have three hours on the first day of the annual meeting in Cotonou for a donors meeting. Cheikh Mbacké and Fatimata will moderate the sessions, but we hope all of you will help guide the discussions as well. Considering the relatively abbreviated time and a very busy week otherwise, we'd like to suggest that we have relatively informal discussion sessions and focus on three topics in particular:

- **Review materials and refine talking points for Ministers meeting (1 hour).** We will have finalized the agenda for the Ministers meeting in advance, but would like to use some time at the donors meeting for last minute review, discussion, and any tuning to how those two days are planned and the roles donors will play.
- **Discuss future governance of the Partnership (1 hour).** In Washington in June we began a discussion about whether the Partnership should expand participation in, or otherwise alter, its governance structures, including by bringing countries into leadership positions, formalizing a steering committee, and other ideas. Due to the time difference, our colleagues in France were unable to participate fully in that discussion. With Anne-Charlotte now on-board, we hoped to revisit the discussion and clarify whether any donor institution believes that changes to governance are necessary and, if so, agree on next steps to determine how and whether to make adjustments.
- **Reflect on the donor perspective on three questions that will be discussed at the annual meeting (1 hour).** Margot has graciously agreed to represent the donor contingent on a panel discussion on day three of the annual meeting, alongside a country, CSO, and WAHO representative, to answer three questions:

– Are there options to increase the value of participation for the nine member countries in the Partnership?

– Are there options to increase the value of participation for the core donors in the Partnership?

– What is the best role for implementing partners to play in the Partnership?

Margot will be in touch in advance to ask your opinions and to share what she is considering saying. We'd like to use this session to discuss the donor perspective on these questions as a group and to identify any particular priorities for 2016 and onward that we can share during the meeting.


