Contexte

En février 2011, le Partenariat de Ouagadougou voyait le jour, en tant que mouvement fédérateur régional, avec pour ambition d'obtenir à l'horizon 2015, 1 million de femmes additionnelles sous méthodes contraceptives modernes. En juillet 2012 à Londres, FP2020, un mouvement similaire a été lancé en tant que mouvement mondial, avec de plus grandes ambitions et une visée plus globale. Les 9 pays du Partenariat de Ouagadougou, font partir de ce mouvement global et ont pris des engagements devant contribuer à la réalisation des objectifs visés par le PO. Afin de permettre aux pays de bien comprendre la collaboration entre ces deux mouvements ou plates formes qui concourent à la réalisation des mêmes objectifs, il sera question à travers cette session de clarifier auprès des pays les collaborations existantes afin d'éviter toute confusion possible.

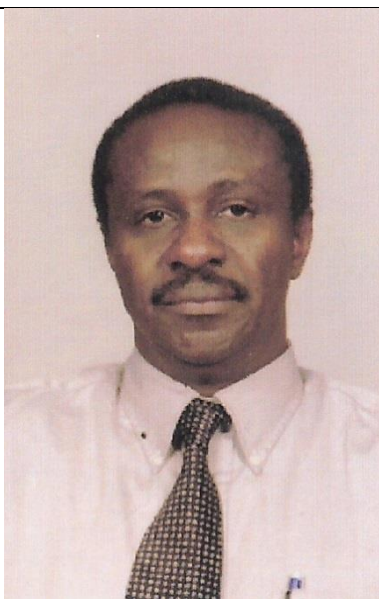
Objectifs de la session

Dr. Cheikh Seydil Moctar Mbacke is an independent consultant and advisor recognized in the field of demographic training and research capacity strengthening on population health in Africa. His consulting work benefits a large number of institutions including the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, the Doris Duke Foundation, the African Development Academy Programs of the Academy of Sciences of the United States, the Population Council, and the INDEPTH Network etc. He serves on the boards of directors of several African institutions with which he shares his large experience in building individual and institutional capacities.

He holds a bachelor's degree in Statistics from the Institute of Statistics in Paris and a PhD in Demography from University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia.
